The attached table lists the approved allocations for the Community Enhancement Program (Org 12900) to be used for the purposes listed pursuant to Board Policy (B-58). Our office certifies that the organizations listed below meet the program eligibility requirements approved by the Board of Supervisors on June 13, 2023 (24).

Recommendation	Organization	Purpose	Allocation
1	Batiquitos Lagoon Foundation	To support the cost of printing educational materials including trail brochures, flora, fauna, and environmental advocacy, and Native Kumeyaay story book. Funds will also support the cost of purchasing bird watching scopes for the public, and the purchase of a new laptop. These materials will assist the foundation's operation of its Nature Center and help preserve, protect, and enhance the Batiquitos Lagoon.	\$10,000
2	Berry Good Food Foundation	To support the garden education programming and administrative support with the costs of staff salaries as well as purchase garden supplies such as soil, seeds, seedlings, and pots. Funds will also support the printing of the "Seeds for the Future" magazine. These programs focus on educating youth and their families on growing their own food.	\$10,000
3	Cesar Chavez Service Club	To support the costs of the Las Mananitas Sponsorship breakfast with the cost of facility rental, staff salary, A/V equipment	\$20,000

		and hotel service. This annual breakfast helps to raise funds to support the Cesar Chavez Service Club in its mission of inspiring K-12 youth to be leaders and change-makers in their communities.	
4	Coastal Roots Farm	To support the environmental STEM, Workforce Development, and Organic Food Distribution Programs with the cost of staff salaries and supply costs, including packaging and shipping. These programs provide education to youth with barrier-free environmental science and nutrition as well as food production and distribution initiatives which ensure low-income families have access to fresh, organic produce. These programs help fulfill Coastal Root's mission of providing a community farm and education center for the community and low-income families.	\$15,000
5	Code With Her	To support the costs of the Coding Culture program with the cost of staff salaries as well as material costs such as microcontrollers, LEDs, other electronic parts, and paper lantern materials. This program helps with achieving their mission of introducing computer science and electrical engineering concepts to traditionally underrepresented groups and youths.	\$10,000
6	Hillel San Diego	To support the salaries of extra security staff at the Melvin Garb and Joseph Glickman Hillel Centers. This added security will help students feel safer and support Hillel of San Diego's mission of enriching Jewish Students lives so they may enrich the world.	\$15,000
7	Housing 4 The Homeless	To support the costs of the afterhours outreach and emergency shelter and wrap around care services with the costs of staff salaries, facility rentals, and outreach supplies including first aid and hygiene kits, and prepackaged food. These programs provide medical and outreach services to homeless on the street as well as provide shelter and medical treatment for high risk and elder individuals. These	\$10,000

		programs aid in H4H's goal of decreasing the number of unhoused and medically fragile individuals on the streets.	
8	MiraCosta College Foundation	To support the costs of mobile internet hotspot units for low-income students. These high-speed internet connection devices will help MiraCosta be able to provide equitable education to MiraCosta students who would not otherwise have access to high-speed internet.	\$15,000
9	San Diego Organizing Project	To support the cost of staff salaries for leadership development and housing justice advocacy programs. The first program trains leaders to shape public policy through building teams and engaging civically with their representatives. The housing justice advocacy focuses on the development of affordable housing units and homelessness prevention. These programs help with SDOP's mission of bringing together key stakeholders in the community to address issues of importance.	\$20,000
10	San Diego Theatrical Training Corporation	To support the costs of studio rental, network access, security and insurance, staff salaries for production, editing, capturing, and streaming of the Union or Bust Podcast. This podcast provides an informative and engaging labor-focused podcast dedicated to educating the public about unions, worker issues, and policies affecting worker rights.	\$15,000
11	Unitarian Universalist Refugee & Immigrant Services & Education	To support all costs for UURISE including staff salaries and facility rentals to provide no cost legal and CARE services co-located with community partners. UURISE serves immigrants and refugees in San Diego County, CA, providing direct legal services to disenfranchised, exploited, vulnerable immigrants whose family situation or circumstances provide a path to legal status or citizenship including youth and young adults with DACA. Social services and advocacy are vetted, researched, and provided by the UURISE Team through CARE Services so as not to	\$10,000

		undermine current or future legal status options.
